**SANTA CRUZ, CA** (January 18, 2023) — The Santa Cruz Museum of Art & History (MAH) is pleased to announce its exhibition program for 2023, which includes solo and group shows, collaborative partnerships, interdisciplinary projects, and the return of its biennial light festival. The schedule features a number of new commissions and premieres by local and visiting artists.

"This year's lineup continues the MAH's curatorial approach that juxtaposes contemporary art with historic preservation, interweaving past and present narratives," said Robb Woulfe, executive director of the MAH. "We look to address some of today's pressing issues—human rights, indigeneity, environmental protection—in the hopes of inspiring understanding and action, while also offering space to explore the realms of technology, science fiction, and pop culture."

Highlights from the season include: an exhibition by the Santa Cruz-based National Geographic contributors Frans Lanting and Chris Eckstrom; an immersive installation of writings by people in prisons around the world, created by Hank Willis Thomas and Dr. Baz Dreisinger; a project by Indigenous artist Cannupa Hanska Luger that blends media, place, storytelling, and documentation; a large-scale geometric art installation by Ukrainian and Canadian artists Yelena Filipchuk and Serge Beaulieu, known as HYBYCOZO; a multi-site, light-based work by Belgian artist couple Tom and Lien Dekyvere; and an exhibition about pioneering female comic book artists. in collaboration with The Center for Monster Studies at UC Santa Cruz.
